Things to Know

- Emiliano Grillo wins second PGA TOUR title almost eight years after winning his first, with both victories in playoffs
- Adam Schenk is now 0-4 when holding the 54-hole lead/co-lead in 171 starts on TOUR
- Scottie Scheffler joins Harris English (second round) with an ace on the eighth hole this week and posts his TOUR-leading 11th top-10 this season
- Harry Hall held 18-, 36- and 54-hole leads/co-leads before posting a career-best T3 result
- Dallas native Paul Haley II sat T96 after the opening round en route to a fifth-place finish
- Defending champion Sam Burns finishes T6 at 5-under

- After finding a penalty area with his tee shot on the 72nd hole and taking a penalty drop, made double bogey to fall to 8-under and waited before defeating Adam Schenk in a sudden-death playoff
- In his 206th PGA TOUR start at the age of 30 years, 8 months, 14 days, wins second PGA TOUR title almost eight years after his first
- Span between his first PGA TOUR victory, which occurred in his rookie season at the 2015 Fortinet Championship, and his Charles Schwab Challenge win is 7 years, 7 months, 10 days (2,779 days); marks the second-longest victory drought snapped this season (Chris Kirk/The Honda Classic/7 years, 9 months, 2 days)
- Both victories have come in sudden-death playoffs (defeated Kevin Na on second extra hole at 2015
 Fortinet Championship)
- 272 (-8) total marks highest winning score at this event since 1999 (Olin Browne/272)
- Joins Roberto De Vicenzo (1957) as the only players from Argentina to win the Charles Schwab Challenge; marks the 13th time an international player wins this event and first since England's Justin Rose (2018)

- One of six players to win on PGA TOUR Latinoamerica (2014 VISA Open de Argentina), Korn Ferry Tour (2015 Korn Ferry Tour Championship) and PGA TOUR (2015 Fortinet Championship, 2023 Charles Schwab Challenge)
- Made seven cuts in eight starts at the Charles Schwab Challenge, including 2023 victory and two additional top-10s (3rd/2018, T8/2021)
- Owns five top-10s in 20 TOUR starts this season (T5/Sanderson Farms Championship, 4th/ZOZO CHAMPIONSHIP, T7/RBC Heritage, T5/Mexico Open at Vidanta, Win/Charles Schwab Challenge)
- Was a member of the International Team at the 2017 Presidents Cup after being selected by Nick Price as a captain's pick

Additional Player Notes

- Adam Schenk (2nd/-8), has improved his eventual finish position in each TOUR event where he has held the 54-hole lead/co-lead (4th/2021 Barracuda Championship, T3/2021 Shriners Children's Open, 2nd/2023 Valspar Championship, playoff defeat/2023 Charles Schwab Challenge); was bogey-free on the back nine this week until bogeys on Nos. 10 and 13 in the final round
- World No. 1 and 2022 Charles Schwab Challenge runner-up **Scottie Scheffler** (T3/-7) makes a hole-in-one at No. 8 with a 7-iron from 189 yards for the second ace of the tournament this week (Harris English/No. 8/R2) and his second ace on TOUR (2014 AT&T Byron Nelson/R3/No. 2); leads in top-10 finishes on TOUR this season (11) and has finished T12 or better in each of his last 14 starts on TOUR
- Harry Hall (T3/-7) began the final round with back-to-back birdies, as he did in the opening round, but made no additional birdies; with five bogeys, including one on the final hole after finding the penalty area off the tee, he missed the playoff by one stroke while seeking his first PGA TOUR title in his 26th start at the age of 25; held at least a share of the 18-, 36- and 54-hole leads this week
- Dallas, Texas, native and sponsor exemption Paul Haley II (5th/-6), who sat T96 after the opening round, posts his career-best result in his 39th start on TOUR (previous best: T12/2022 Fortinet Championship); made seven birdies in the final round, the most by any player; successfully qualified via Sectional Qualifying for the 2023 U.S. Open on Monday this week
- Michael Kim (T6/-5) notches his third top-10 this season (5th/Puerto Rico Open, 7th/Wells Fargo
 Championship) and one of two bogey-free rounds on Sunday (Kurt Kitayama); also went bogey-free in the
 opening round to be one of three players with two bogey-free rounds this week (Robby Shelton, Chad
 Ramey)
- With his lowest final-round score (67) in 10 appearances at the Charles Schwab Challenge, **Rickie Fowler** (T6/-5) posts his second top-10 at this event (T5/2012, T6/2023) and fifth top-10 this season
- Defending Charles Schwab Challenge champion **Sam Burns** (T6/-5) birdies his final two holes to earn his fifth top-10 this season and 27th top-10 on TOUR
- Mark Hubbard (T9/-4) is the only player in the field to post four sub-70 rounds (69-69-69)
- **Kevin Streelman** (T9/-4), currently No. 109 in the FedExCup, is one of four players (Adam Scott, Matt Kuchar, Jason Day) to qualify for the FedExCup Playoffs in each of the last 15 FedExCup seasons
