### Things to Know

- At 10-under, 18- and 36-hole solo leader Harry Hall and Adam Schenk share the third-round lead at the Charles Schwab Challenge; marks the first time since 2014 that the event does not have a solo leader after 54 holes
- Hall becomes the first player to shoot over par in the third round and finish the round leading/co-leading in a non-major since Sam Burns in the 2021 Genesis Invitational
- Prior to Hall, the last time a player shot over par in the third round at the Charles Schwab Challenge and held at least a share of the 54-hole lead: 1990 Ben Crenshaw shot 72 in the third round and followed it up with a 66 in the final round
- Hall holds the third-round lead/co-lead for the first time in his 26th PGA TOUR start; Schenk holds the third-round lead/co-lead for the third time in individual stroke-play events (0-for-2 to date converting to victory)
- Defending champion Sam Burns trails by seven in bid to join Ben Hogan as players to successfully defend the tournament's title; Burns also trailed by seven entering the final round before winning in 2022
- Scottie Scheffler trails by six strokes in attempt to become the first World No. 1 to win the Charles Schwab Challenge since Adam Scott in 2014
- With a win this week, Scheffler would become the first player since Ryuji Imada at the 2008 AT&T Classic to win a tournament after losing in a playoff at that tournament the year prior

- 14 Third-round leaders/co-leaders at the Charles Schwab Challenge to win (since 1990) (Most recent: Kevin Na/2019)
- 17 Third-round leaders/co-leaders to win individual stroke-play events in 2022-23 (most recent: Brooks Koepka/PGA Championship)

- At 10-under 200, holds a share of the third-round lead with 36-hole leader Harry Hall at the Charles Schwab Challenge
- Holds the third-round lead/co-lead on the PGA TOUR for the third time (171 starts) in individual strokeplay events on TOUR, most recently 2023 Valspar Championship (2<sup>nd</sup>); note: also led the 2021 Barracuda Championship through 54 holes (Modified Stableford Format)
- Seeks his first TOUR win; best finish in 171 TOUR starts is solo second at the 2023 Valspar Championship

- At 10-under 200, holds a share of the third-round lead with Adam Schenk
- Becomes the first player to shoot over par in the third round and finish the round leading/co-leading in a non-major since Sam Burns in the 2021 Genesis Invitational
- Holds the third-round lead/co-lead for the first time in his 26<sup>th</sup> PGA TOUR start
- The last player to win the Charles Schwab Challenge in debut appearance: Sergio Garcia (2001)
- Best finish in 25 TOUR starts is T7 at the 2023 Puerto Rico Open

# **Additional Player Notes**

- Four-time PGA TOUR winner Harris English (3<sup>rd</sup>/-9) has two top-five finishes at Colonial Country Club (2<sup>nd</sup>/2016, T5/2012)
- World No. 1 and 2022 Charles Schwab Challenge runner-up **Scottie Scheffler** (T10/-4) has finished T12 or better in his last 13 starts on TOUR; 2014 champion Adam Scott is the last World No. 1 to win the Charles Schwab Challenge
- Defending Charles Schwab Challenge champion **Sam Burns** (T16/-3) seeks to join Ben Hogan (1946-47, 1952-53) as the only players to win the event in back-to-back years; trails by seven in bid to join Ben Hogan as players to successfully defend the tournament's title; Burns also trailed by seven entering the final round before winning in 2022
