

## COLONIAL'S DIFFICULTY STANDS TEST OF TIME

### Tournament Records

Using the tournament scoring record of each 72-hole event's current courses on the PGA Tour, as well as majors, Colonial's historic and challenging layout ranks it among the top 16 toughest of the year against par, and the thirteenth toughest of full field Tour FedExCup events.

### Champion Scoring

Using the champion's winning score versus par, Colonial's challenging layout again shows its toughness. The course is in the top 13 overall, and the 9th hardest of full-field Tour FedExCup events. In 2017, Colonial ranked 7th hardest of all Tour events and majors, in relation to par. Here are the 72-hole PGA Tour event winners' average number of strokes under par per round, beginning with 1990.

A Colonial tradition has all living champions collectively choose two promising newcomers who have never been invited here as professionals. Colonial's champs have proven they know how to pick future stars. Just two months after he was a Champions' Choice at Colonial, Jack Fleck won the 1955 U.S. Open. Dave Stockton won here as a Champions' Choice in 1967. Here are all the picks:

75 of Colonial's 129 Champions' Choices have become PGA Tour tournament winners, racking up a total of 415 victories, including 28 major championships. 1970 choice Hale Irwin tops the list with 20 career victories, including three U.S. Open titles. 1986 Choice Davis Love III has 22 victories, including a PGA Championship. 1978 choice Curtis Strange claimed 17 victories, with two U.S. Open wins. Three players have 16 Tour wins: Mike Souchak (1954), Hubert Green (1971) and Mark O'Meara (1981). Other choices who have gone on to double-digit career wins are: Tom Weiskopf (15), Dow Finsterwald (12), Craig Stadler (13), Paul Azinger (12), Jason Day (12), Jordan Spieth (11), Al Geiberger (11), Gay Brewer (11), Miller Barber (11), Dave Stockton (11), Andy Bean (11), Don January (10) & John Cook (10). ## COLONIAL'S AMATEURS

Colonial has invited amateurs to its select field since its inception in 1946, and now invites one or two amateurs each year. The reigning Ben Hogan Award winner and U.S. Amateur champ always receives the earliest invites.

Colonial's tradition of inviting the SWC champion every year began in 1979, when co-champions Fred Couples and Payne Stewart had a playoff to see who would receive the bid. With the end of the SWC, the tournament reserved any second invitation for a

top national amateur, such as the Hogan Award winner.

Four of Colonial's amateurs over the years returned later to win the tournament: Cary Middlecoff, Homero Blancas, Ben Crenshaw and Jack Nicklaus.

## COLONIAL'S PLAYOFFS

Colonial has needed only 11 playoffs in its 70-year history to determine a champion. The first two playoffs were 18-hole Monday rounds following Sunday's tie. The sudden-death playoff format has been used ever since, beginning in 1983. The last eight playoffs have all been won with a birdie. Two of the last three involved three players.

**1959** - Ben Hogan defeated Fred Hawkins, 69-73. (18 holes)

**1962** - Arnold Palmer defeated Johnny Pott, 69-73. (18 holes)

**1983** - Jim Colbert defeated Fuzzy Zoeller in sudden death with par on sixth playoff hole (#18). Playoff held on holes 16, 17 & 18, each played twice.

**1984** - Peter Jacobsen defeated Payne Stewart with a birdie on the first extra hole (#15).

**1986** - Dan Pohl defeated Payne Stewart in this rain-shortened event with a birdie on the first extra hole (#16).

**1992** - Bruce Lietzke defeated Corey Pavin with a birdie on the first extra hole (#17).

**1994** - Nick Price defeated Scott Simpson with a birdie on the first extra hole (#18).

**2006** - Tim Herron defeated Richard S. Johnson with a birdie on the second extra hole (#17).

**2007** - Rory Sabbatini defeated Jim Furyk and Bernhard Langer with a birdie on the first extra hole (#18).

**2009** - Steve Stricker defeated Tim Clark and Steve Marino with birdie on second extra hole (#17). (Marino exited after first playoff hole.)

**2014** - Adam Scott defeated Jason Dufner with birdie on third extra hole (#18).

## BRIEFLY SPEAKING

### Triple Crown

Colonial is the only club in America to host the U.S. Open (1941), the Players Championship (1975), and an annual PGA Tour event (since 1946). In 1991, it added the U.S. Women's Open to its unique repertoire of championships.

### Colonial Sixth To Achieve \$100,000 Gate

When Colonial National Invitation ticket sales totaled \$111,613 in 1961, Colonial thereby became but the sixth tournament in all of golf to achieve a \$100,000 gate. Others previously having done so included: the U.S. Open, the PGA Championship, the Masters, the Houston Open and the Bing Crosby. Today, the annual gate is about \$7 million.

### Highest Scores On Par Fours

Five players have cracked double figures - 10 - on a par four hole during the tournament. Tommy Armour III did it first on No. 9 in the 1990 event. Lee Rinker also made a 10 on the ninth hole, in the 1996 tournament. Also in 1996, Mark Calcavecchia made a 10 on No. 17. In 2018 Nick Taylor made a 10 on #9. But in 2001, Dennis Paulson made a 12 on the 9th hole, to set the current high water mark - no pun intended.

The only other 10 ever recorded came in 1990, by David Ogrin, but on the par five first hole.

Twenty-one players have fired nines on par-fours at Colonial: Dick Mayer on No. 7 in 1951; Fred Hawkins on No. 18 in 1952; Al Bessellink on No. 15 in 1955; Jack Harden on No. 15 in 1955; Don January on No. 18 in 1957; Chandler Harper on No. 17 in 1958; Gene Littler on No. 14 in 1959; Lloyd Mangrum on No. 10 in 1961; Tommy Bolt on No. 9 in 1964; John Schlee on No. 10 in 1967; Tommy Aaron and Bunky Henry on No. 12 in 1970; Barry Jaeckel on No. 5 in 1983 and 1984; Gary Hallberg on No. 9 in 1984; Ben Crenshaw on No. 9 in 1985; Larry Rinker on No. 9 in 1986; Mark Wiebe on No. 9 in 1989; Tommy Armour III on No. 9 in 1991; Kevin Na on No. 3 in 2004; Mike Weir on No. 9 in 2005; and Jason Kokrak on No. 18 in 2016.

### Way Over Par

Several golfers have scored nines on par four holes, but only Fred Hawkins has carded a nine on a par three. The unfortunate incident occurred in 1965 when Hawkins went six over par on the 16th hole.

### Million Milestones

Following a record-breaking Friday crowd of 35,313 during the 1982 tournament, officials announced that Colonial achieved its first \$1 million gate. This was but one of several "million" milestones Colonial has reached:

- The official one millionth visitor passed through the gates at Colonial during the third round of the 1969 tournament;
- Colonial first surpassed the \$1 million mark in total prize money distributed in 1969;
- Colonial offered its first million-dollar purse in 1989;
- Phil Mickelson became the first player to surpass \$1 million in lifetime earnings at Colonial in 2001;
- The first million-dollar first place check was awarded in 2005, to Kenny Perry.

Estimated attendance at the first tournament in 1946 was 16,600. Lowest attendance ever was 1947, an estimated 12,800 after a round was rained out. Paid revenue for the tournament in 1948 (earlier figures are not available) was \$22,696. In 1961, the tournament passed the \$100,000 mark. Then in 1967 the paid attendance soared beyond \$200,000.

Attendance steadily increased until the million dollar mark was cracked in 1982. Sherman Wallace of Fort Worth, designated the millionth visitor in 1969, was given a lifetime pass to Colonial and a new car.

Phil Mickelson became the first player to win \$1 million in his Colonial career with a second place finish in 2001. Nick Price joined him with his second victory in 2002. Now 30 players carry that distinction.

### Course Record

Keith Clearwater set the Colonial course record of 61 during the second round in 1993. Then in the fourth round Lee Janzen tied it. The marks broke the eight-year-old record of 62 set by Joey Sindelar in 1985. (Strangely, neither player birdied either one of the par fives during his record round.)

Then in 1999 Greg Kraft tied the record with a 61 in the third round. In the record breaking year of 2003, Kenny Perry and Justin Leonard tied the mark with 61s of their own. Leonard's was under "lift, clean and place" rules, however. Both players shot 29 on the front side on the weekend. Leonard had a shot at 59, but bogeyed the 18th hole. Chad Campbell joined the 61 crowd in 2004 with a round that included two *bogeys*!

Clearwater began his phenomenal round with a non-descript 33 on the front nine, birdieing holes 6 and 7. Then he blistered the back nine with a record seven-under 28, using seven consecutive birdies from holes 12-18. The final birdie putt, on 18, was a 60-foot, double-break stunner from the back of the green. All but two of the back nine birdie putts were from 12 feet or farther.

Janzen did his most damage on the front nine with a five-under 30, birdieing holes 2, 3, 6, 7 and 8. He then closed with a 31 on the back, with birdies on 10, 12, 15 and 18. Kraft fired a 32 on the front and a 29 on the back, including birdies on the last four holes - with a chip-in on #18. His round included a bogey, too.

Sindelar's 62 had been tied twice, by Gene Sauers in 1990 and Steve Elkington in 1991. Ironically, each player started his magical round on the 10th hole. (If not for a bogey on No. 5, Sindelar would have had Colonial's first 61 instead of Clearwater.)

Sindelar cracked the record of 63 held by Dale Douglass and Bruce Lietzke. Douglass claimed the record in 1970 by breaking the oldest mark in the book - Ben Hogan's 65 from the first tournament in 1946. Lietzke carded his 63 in the first round in 1980, with an ace on the 16th hole. Lietzke went on to win the event.

61 is the lowest round ever shot by a champion (Perry), with two others shooting 62 - Sabbatini in 2007 and Toms in 2011 (twice!).

### Consecutive Tournaments

Cary Middlecoff was the only golfer to play in each of the first 18 Colonial tournaments. Middlecoff, who won the tournament in 1951, competed here from 1946 through 1964. Ben Hogan competed in the first 16 tournaments before missing the 1963 NIT.

Ben Crenshaw shares the longest consecutive streak record at Colonial. He played in 32 straight from 1971-2002, including two victories. He is tied with Corey Pavin, whose streak of 32 ran from 1984-2015, and has also won twice.

Bruce Lietzke played in 27 consecutive tournaments, and won two of them. Billy Mayfair played in 26 straight from 1987-2012. Mark Brooks played in 26 consecutive tournaments, 1986-2011. 1987 champion Keith Clearwater had a streak of 23 straight, from 1987-2009. Justin Leonard played in 21 straight, from 1995-2015. Lee Trevino played in 20 consecutive events, and won two of them.

Tom Kite played in 22 straight tournaments from 1972-93 and amazingly made the cut in *every one* of them, including his first appearance, as an amateur. Bob Tway also played in 22 straight, from 1986-2007. Dave Stockton played in 19 consecutive tournaments beginning in 1967, the year he won it.

Gene Littler played in 18 straight tournaments, 1954-71, before missing the 1972 event. Illness prevented Littler from playing the year after he won the Colonial championship in '71. Al Geiberger also played in 18 consecutive tournaments, beginning in 1970, and won two of them.

The longest active streak is held by Tim Herron, at 20 - from 1999-2018.
